

Monument Unveiled.

The next number on the program was the singing of "The Bonnie Blue Flag" and "My Old Kentucky Home," by thirteen young ladies dressed to represent thirteen Southern States and the old Confederate flag. This was one of the most beautiful features of the ceremony. As Mrs. Cone Johnson stepped to that part of the platform where was tied in a silken bow the cords that held in place the veil, the great congregation reverently uncovered. One swift movement of her hand and the huge canvas parted and dropped around the base, disclosing to view the monument. The scene was affecting and tears dimmed the eyes of many. Lines were now opened and little children marching in a circle placed wreaths of flowers at the feet of the veterans, after which the benediction was pronounced by Rev. H. C. Risner. Before leaving Oakwood the graves of all Confederate soldiers received a tribute of flowers from the hands of the Daughters.

The monument unveiled today is the culmination of years of labor of the Mollie Moore Davis Chapter, of this city. Tyler has the only National Confederate Soldiers' Cemetery in Texas. In the largest block in the central portion of Oakwood are interred the remains of 231 soldiers, who died and were buried here during the war. For this reason the Daughters placed the monument over the graves of these unknown Confederate dead, although the statue was erected to the memory of all of the Confederate soldiers of Smith County.

Inscription on Monument.

The monument has a handsome base and pedestal, on which is a figure, more than life size, of a private Confederate soldier. On the west face of the base is engraved:

"In Tender Reverence of the Memory of the Soldiers from Smith County Who Fought in the Armies of the Confederacy."

On the west front of the pedestal are the words:

"Erected by Mollie Moore Davis Chapter, United Daughters of the Confederacy by Popular Subscription, A. D. 1907."

On the north front is the inscription:

"The Confederacy gave to the world its best type of soldiers. 1861-1865."

On the east front one reads:

"Fame has erected another monument to the honor and valor of the Confederate soldiers, more endearing than this and towering into the skies."

The south front records the fact that:

"The dust of 231 brave Confederate soldiers, who at the call of duty fought for the right, reposes here. After forty years they are still remembered and honored because they died for their country."



The morning was warm, and the waters off Charleston Harbor were unusually calm. It was perhaps the same sort of sea conditions *Hunley* commander Lt. Dixon was waiting for in 1864 when he and his crew launched the experimental vessel that began the age of modern-day submarines.

But this day would not mark the beginning of the *Hunley* crew's mission, but rather the completion of their century long journey to a final burial. On April 17th, 2004, the submarine pioneers that manned the first successful combat submarine were finally buried 140 years later..


The ceremony began at 9:15 a.m. with a memorial service at White Points Garden. Immediately after the ceremony, horse drawn caissons followed by a procession of men and women dressed in 19th century attire brought the crew to their final resting place. The procession marched 4.5-miles through downtown Charleston, and ended at Magnolia Cemetery. The *Hunley's* eight-man crew was then laid to rest next to others who lost their lives on *Hunley* test missions.





“Things They Carried”

While visiting the CSA Hunley submarine in Charleston, South Carolina, I began wondering how these young sailors would have coped with being so far from home. What had they brought with them to remind them of their loved ones at home? Had they brought with them some type of good luck charm? According to legend, Hunley Captain George Dixon was given a \$20 gold coin by his sweetheart when he left for war. During the Battle of Shiloh, Dixon was shot. The bullet struck the coin in his trouser pocket, absorbing the impact of the shot and sparing his life. Countless legends are born during war, but few are ever proven. For 137 years, no one knew whether the story was a historical fact or a romantic tale passed from generation to generation.

During the excavation of the Hunley, a gold coin minted in 1860 was discovered lying on Dixon’s hip bone. It was warped from the impact of a bullet, and traces of lead were discovered on the coin. One side bears the image of Lady Liberty, and the other has been sanded and inscribed with the following words:

Shiloh
April 6th 1862
My life Preserver
G. E. D.

If I were sending my husband, son, father or brother to the War Between the States, what would I have given them to carry into battle? Would it have been a gold coin, a picture of myself and the children, a Bible, a diary, a lock of hair, an extra pair of glasses, or my favorite piece of jewelry, perhaps one of our children’s favorite toy soldier or doll or maybe my lace handkerchief. What would you have sent to war with your loved ones? Let us remember and honor all of our veterans that have gone to war through the decades.


